

Your Guide to the New Vaccination Rule For Show Horses



At USEF-licensed competitions, horses entering show grounds must have documentation of Equine Influenza Virus (EIV) and Equine Herpesvirus (EHV) /rhinopneumonitis vaccination within 6 months.



Vaccines should be administered by or under a veterinarian's direction per the manufacturer's recommendations.

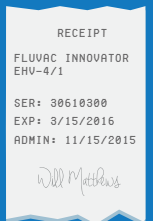
What should your documentation look like?



If a veterinarian administered the vaccine, he or she should provide proof that the horse was vaccinated, when, and with what product.



If someone other than a vet administered the vaccine, he or she must provide a receipt for the vaccine that includes: vaccine name, serial number, expiration date, administration date, owner/caretaker signature.



If the horse has not been vaccinated due to a history of adverse reactions, you must provide a letter stating such, along with a log of temperatures taken twice daily for the 7 days prior. Continue taking/logging temperatures twice daily while at the show.
